Be a hero—give blood

Every day, there are patients in our community who need blood transfusions. Whether it is due to an emergency or ongoing medical care, there are children and adults who depend on frequent lifesaving transfusions to keep them alive.

Summer is a tough time of the year. High schools are closed, many regular donors take vacations, and more cars on the road can lead to more car accidents and a potential increase in the need for blood.

It takes 900 people, registering every week-day, to keep our community's blood supply at stable levels. When you make your list of supplies for a visit to Mt. Rainier, a barbeque party, a trip to the beach or a ferry ride to the San Juan Islands, consider putting "donate blood" on your to-do list.

Donating blood takes about an hour out of your busy summer schedule, but it is an hour well spent. Each blood donation is a gift of life, potentially saving three lives.

Blood donations help not only those who have suffered trauma, but also those with cancer, surgery patients and premature babies.

The Puget Sound Blood Center is an independent, community-based blood center internationally recognized for its research, medical and blood and tissue services. Celebrating over 60 years of innovation, the Blood Center has a long and unique tradition of blending community volunteerism, medical science and research to improve patient's lives. The Blood Center, serving patients in more than 70 hospitals and clinics in 14 counties with blood services, pro-

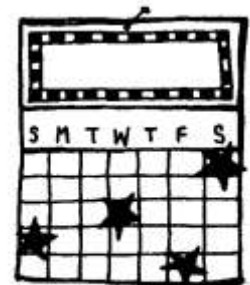
vides tissue and transplantation support to 185 hospitals across the Northwest.

All who are able are encouraged to donate. Donors must be 18 or older (16 or 17 with a Blood Center parental permission form), weigh at least 110 pounds and be in good general health.

Elaine Stanovsky elected bishop

The Rev. Elaine J. W. Stanovsky of Seattle has been elected a bishop by the Western Jurisdictional Conference of The United Methodist Church. Elaine is the sister of Doug Woodworth, member of Bear Creek UMC, and Pastor Melvin Woodworth.

Stanovsky, 54, a district superintendent in Seattle, was elected on July 19 on the 25th ballot. She is the last of eight new U.S. bishops recently elected at five jurisdictional meetings across the United States. She will fill one of two openings in the church's Western Jurisdiction. The Rev. Grant Hagiya, of Redondo Beach, California, will fill the other.

Ordained as a United Methodist deacon in 1981 and as an elder in 1983, Stanovsky has served Washington congregations in Renton and Seattle and headed the Church Council of Greater Seattle from 1990 to 1995. She has been a district superintendent in Puget

Sound and in Tacoma, as well as a director of connectional ministries for the Pacific-Northwest Conference and assistant to the bishop.

She will become one of 50 active U.S. bishops, including six serving the 12-state Western Jurisdiction. The jurisdiction is home to 390,000 United Methodists in seven annual conferences that span Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming, as well as one missionary conference in Alaska.

Elaine has a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Puget Sound and a Master of Divinity from Harvard Divinity School.

"I claim my baptism this day and the special callings to which God has called me," said an emotional Stanovsky after her election was announced. "...May God lead

us faithfully forward in the name of Jesus Christ."

Surrounded by her husband, Clinton Stanovsky, and their three grown sons, she said she has thought a lot about family as of late. "I am so grateful for a family that brought me into the church," she said.

The United Methodist Church was created in 1968 by a merger of the Evangelical United Brethren and Methodist churches. Methodists elected their bishops at one national gathering until 1940, when the jurisdictional system was instituted. Bishops in the EUB church were elected at one national gathering until 1968.

A Single's Perspective

For just about the first time in my life, I find myself single. I got married a month after my 20th birthday, and I was married to Jim for 18 years—10 great ones and eight going steadily downhill. Within just a few months after our divorce, I became involved in a long-term relationship that lasted for a little over a year.

When he dumped me, beating me and leaving me for dead in a gas station parking lot in San Diego, I moved into a Catholic Charities homeless shelter, as many of you know. Six weeks later I got a job at Catholic Charities day center for homeless and very low-income women. I was able to rent an apartment in Tijuana. Within a couple of weeks, husband number two, Mario, moved in, and we were married about six months later. That one lasted five years.

So now I'm 48, disabled, unable to work a regular 40-hour a week job, but working two part-time jobs, going to school full time to try to get out of the cycle of poverty I am in—and single. My goal is to teach and write, knowing that far more money will come in from the teaching than the writing.

I want to get off of Social Security disability and be able to support myself. I believe teaching is the answer because teaching two classes at community college here in on the Eastside is considered two-thirds time and makes one eligible **for all benefits. The pay's not great,** but it is enough that I will be able to buy another car someday when my current one dies (and I pray that **isn't for a long time!**). it will put a roof over my head and food in my mouth, and **that's all I really want.** I believe that this is a job I could consistently do with my arthritis. I have two years to go to finish my **bachelor's degree, and once I start my master's program, they will pay me!** I'll teach a **Composition 101 course,** and for that they waive all tuition and pay a stipend.

So anyway—here I am, single—and I LOVE IT!!! I have really never been happier. I know what

some of you are already thinking: ***she's putting on a brave front—of course she'd rather be married!***

No, really! I love being single! For the first time in my life, I am the one making all the decisions. I decide what time to go to bed, what time to get up. I decide when, where and what to eat. I have given **up television while I'm in school, but** if I did watch it, I could decide what to watch. I decide how much time I spend with my kids and how much **time I spend alone (I'm a very outgoing, social person, but I also require large amounts of alone time).**

My clear, well-defined goal and intention is to not even *think* about men or dating or meeting someone during the next four years until I am completely done with college. This is something I have wanted for a long, **long time and I don't want to fall in** love with someone, quit school, and once again put my own desires on the back burner.

Now some of you may be thinking: ***she just hasn't found the right man yet.*** Well, that may be true, I seem to have trouble distinguishing the good ones from the not-so-great ones. ***But I think I can safely say on behalf of all the single folks at BCUMC, that singleness is not somehow a lesser, or diminished, state of being. It truly is possible to be single and to be content.***

So if you're wondering how to treat us single folk, here are some simple rules:

DON'T suggest eHarmony or Match.com. Yes, my daughter and her fiancé met on Match.com and at least one couple in our church met on eHarmony. I know these options **exist, but I'm not interested right** now. Thank you.

DON'T tell me who all the single men are in the church. One dear soul even went so far as to send me a church directory in which she had kindly placed check marks by the pictures and names of the single men. I know who they are. I am **friends with some of them. But it's** just not going to happen, so please accept that.

DON'T fix me up! If someday I

want your help, I will ask. I promise. But not now.

DO invite me to functions or to your homes for dinner, or an evening out. A good friend (also single) has invited me to go with her to the Seattle Art Museum to see the new Impressionist exhibit. I spend tons of time with my kids (Joy and her fiancé Andy and my son Joe). I belong to a couple of social service **women's organizations. But I'd love** to spend time with some of you, **too. I'm not the type to feel like a** fifth wheel or out of place if there **are an "odd" number of people at** the dinner table.

DO know that my financial resources are extremely and severely limited. I must say, this is the one draw-back of being single. I am completely alone with my finances! The trip to the SAM will be my outing for August. So inviting me to dinner or to things that are not costly, like out for coffee and dessert, or to a free concert in the park, are good options.

DO treat me like "one of the gang." Singleness is not a contagious disease! It won't rub off on you, I promise! This is one thing I absolutely *love* about the Celebration Choir! We are all friends and we all tease each other, and I always feel included, and not just because **I'm the director! (smile)**

So there you have it. I am content. Right now I am living with the Stewart family and could not be **more grateful. I don't have my own** home, my car is the worst-looking **car I've ever seen. I barely scrape** by financially, and some months not even that. I am in a rigorous program at a school that completely consumes my time. There are no men in my life and I want to keep it that way for the foreseeable future. But as I said earlier, *I have never been happier!*

So please believe me. Treat me like a regular person. Invite me **over. Let's not have any gap** between married and single folks. **Let's live together in harmony, but** please, just not on eHarmony! (smile).
